Spring's new growth is flourishing. The celebrations

of this time of year are also exuberant and celebrate growth. Among Christians in the northern hemisphere there is connection between the celebration of the greening of the earth and continuing celebration of Easter-resurrection-new life.

What is greening and flowering in the world around and within us?

On one hand, I can answer this question with reflections on the continuing pandemic. I feel a flowering of the world as it seems to be opening up to greater interaction. People are finding opportunities to gather and interact in new and familiar ways. Worship gatherings, here at Emmanuel and in many places, are flowering with practices both familiar and innovative. The hope for May is that our hybrid service will be settle into a pattern, and that the 9 AM liturgical service, held with Calvary, will be a vibrant service. On the other hand, I would like to leave the question open for each of us to reflect upon. I invite each of us to consider a practice of reflection during May. Then ask yourself this question: "what is greening and flowering in my life?" This may be in the circumstances of your life, or perhaps it is within, in your soul. Whatever it may be write it down. Consider periodically returning to that place, see how the plants have grown, and consider how what you have written has grown.

History of Emmanuel Lutheran Church from the 75th Anniversary Book. 1882-1957

The principles that Emmanuel was founded on sound very familiar for us today.

- 1. An unusual independence of spirit among the laity. Emmanuel has, from her very beginning, been a gathering place for those who could not find a spiritual home in congregations who, in years past, seemed to be dominated by a narrow pietism or were lacking in Christian tolerance. Frequently in Emmanuel's history her laymen have fostered new creative ideas which have later become established policy in the Lutheran church life of Rockford.
- 2. An identification with the community through early acceptance of the English language. The Pastors have been encouraged to accept leadership in community projects throughout her history.
- A concern for good government and a sound conviction concerning the relevance of the Christian Gospel in modern civil life. Historically, Emmanuel members have built up an amazing record of public service in positions of sacred trust.
- 4. A pulpit free to discuss controversial issues in a spirit of intelligent devotion to truth in the light of the abiding Christian revelation.
- 5. An insistence upon the highest standards of culture and religious artistry— not only in architecture and symbolism but also in music, instrumental and vocal. Consistently, Emmanuel has sought to merit the name often given to er by many distinguished visitors, "The Church Beautiful."

Volunteer. Strive for 30 min. of daily physical activity. Make a list of self-rewards. Use available, healthy and helpful strategies. Find your people. Seek professional help. May is Mental Health Month.
